

Background

[DigiGen](#) is a European Horizon 2020 research project that is developing significant knowledge about how children and young people (ranging from 5-18 years old), a group growing up today often referred to as the Digital Generation, use and are affected by the technological transformations in their everyday lives.

The research is uncovering both harmful and beneficial effects of technology in the everyday lives of children and young people. This includes a focus on the family, educational institutions, leisure time and children and young people's civic participation.

DigiGen aims to fill current research gaps such as scarcity of qualitative research in this domain, lack of involvement of children and young people in the research design, and the under-representation of children under the age of 12.

An important aspect of DigiGen is its **aim to contribute to effective social, educational, and online safety policies and practices in collaboration with national and international stakeholders**. On European level, the DigiGen data will be highly relevant in relation to the Digital Decade, the updated Digital Education Action Plan, the European Strategy on the Rights of the Child, the European Pillar for Social Rights, and the updated Better Internet for Kids Strategy.

June 2021 marks the mid-term point of the DigiGen project which is why on **22 June 2021** we are organising the **DigiGen Policy Forum** which will take place online and bring together key policy, academic, and practice stakeholders working on securing safer and more beneficial use of digital technologies for children and young people. The forum will take a dialogic form in which provisional findings of the project are presented and the participants are consulted on the most important directions of DigiGen's future policy and practice engagement in view of the development of policy briefs and recommendations for a variety of audiences.

We aim to engage with **youth representatives, policy makers from the European, national and local level, civil society, education experts, and industry representatives**. The policy forum serves to better understand the needs of this variety of stakeholders in order to fully reach the potential DigiGen's data has to support you with evidence-based policy and practice recommendations.
